TO SUMMER SCHOOL OR NOT TO SUMMER SCHOOL?

It is not a requirement.

Attending summer school is *not* required to meet graduation requirements; however, summer school can increase your future course options. Recommend taking summer school AFTER 9th grade.

For the student who aspires to . . .

- take four years of fine arts, or
- take journalism all four years, or
- take computer science or engineering all four years, or
- take a study hall every semester all four years, or
- exceed graduation requirements across the core subjects.

Or you just have a lot of time on your hands and need something constructive and structured in your life.

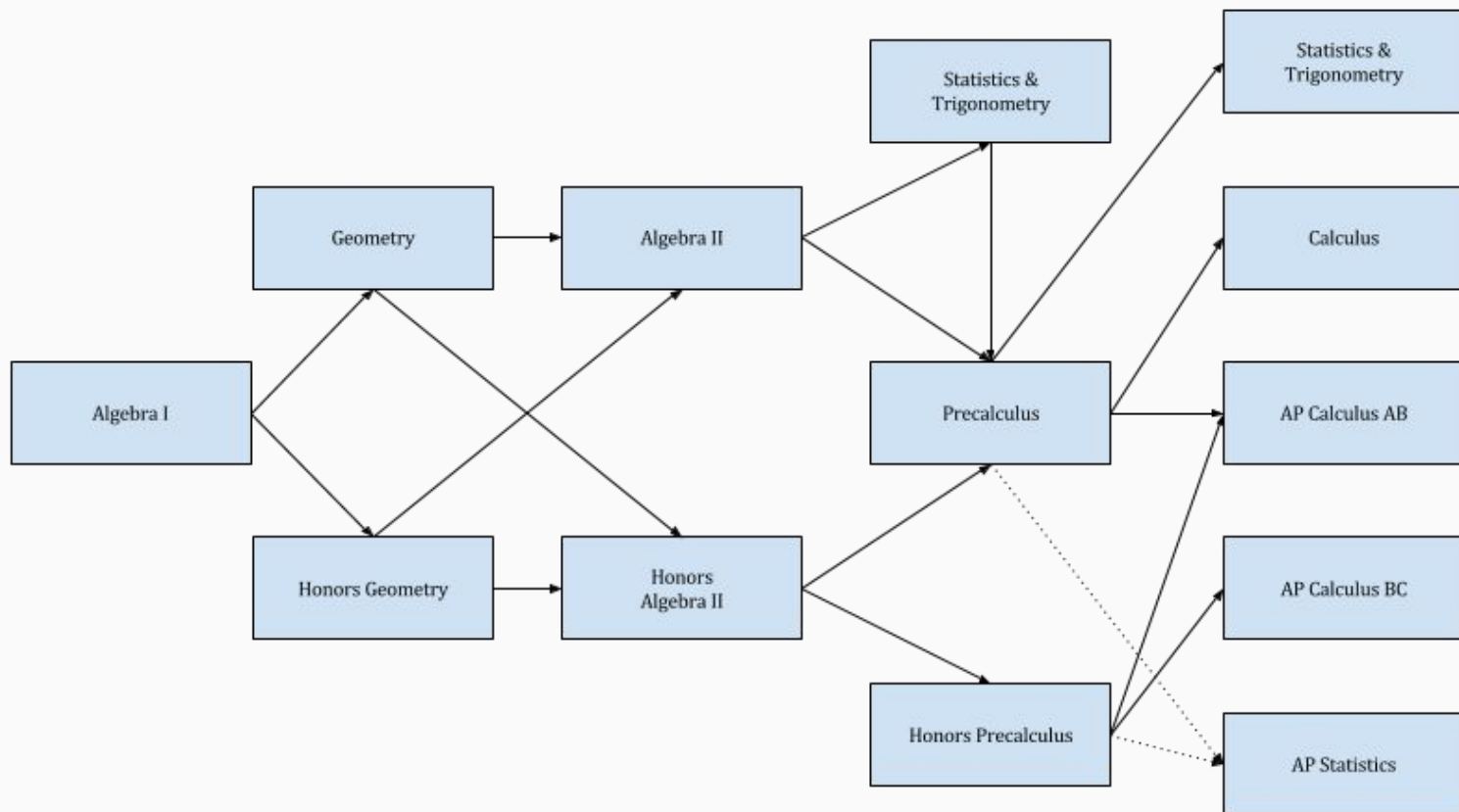

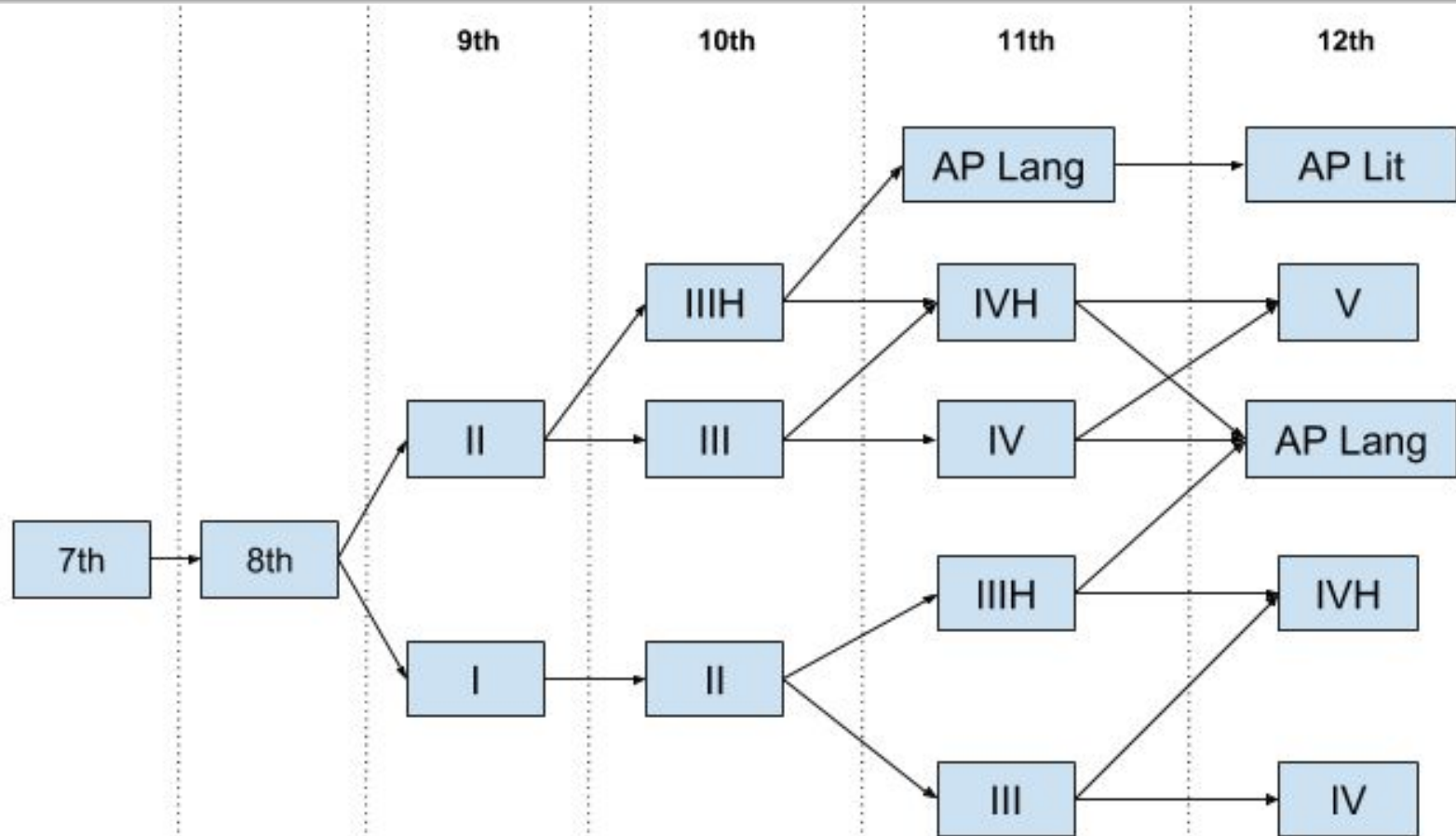


